PLENARY SESSION - TRENDS IN IRREGULAR AND MASS MIGRATION AND THB

According to UNHCR figures by May 2024, more than 120 million people were forcibly displaced worldwide as a result of persecution, conflict, violence or human rights violations. This includes 43.4 million refugees, 63.3 million internally displaced people, 6.9 million asylum seekers and 5.8 million people in need of international protection. But it is not just conflict and persecution that drives migration. Economic and educational opportunities are also major drivers and, in the years to come, climate change will play an increasing role in setting people on the move. Human traffickers exploit these people at their most vulnerable to extort money and drive migrants into slave labour and the sex trade. Whether it is conflicts, natural disasters or economics, the flow of migrants from poor southern countries to rich northern ones is probably only going to increase. PLENARY SESSION - MARITIME AND BIG RIVERS

Rivers create a particular set of problems for border management. Rivers can flow hundreds and thousands of kilometres from the ocean into national territories. Indeed, rivers make up 23 percent of all international borders. South America has the largest number of international borders made up by rivers—nearly half. Brazil, Colombia, Venezuela, Suriname, Guyana, French, Guiana, Bolivia, Paraguay, and Uruguay. On the Indian subcontinent the rivers Ganga, Brahmaputra and Indus are shared with neighbouring countries, India Nepal, Bhutan, China, Bangladesh and Pakistan. As an example of the complexity the Danube can be navigated by ocean going vessels from the Black Sea 2,400 km into the very heart of Europe, passing through or making up part of the border of ten of those countries. PLENARY SESSION - OSINT (OPEN SOURCE INTELLIGENCE) AT THE BORDER

How do we disrupt or prevent travel of bad actors? Information sharing between some governments is good, but any gaps will be exploited. Interpol and ICAO are starting to provide greater access to what were previously government access only systems. But is there a role for non-government actors, including industry, to deter or prevent travel of criminals, victims of modern slavery, traffickers and terrorists. The use of OSINT (Open-Source Intelligence) is not new and has been used by the military and national intelligence agencies for many years, but advances in AI, communications technology and the growth in the use of social media and communications apps, means that publicly available data can not only help border law enforcement begin to map out and identify linkages in the wider criminal networks behind smuggling and trafficking. But it can also now provide actionable insights to border agents in real time. How can border and intelligence agencies and their partners in industry cooperate in delivering optimum results from OSINT.

The G4 Initiative was launch by the Gendarmerie Forces of France, Italy, Portugal and Spain and seeks to strengthen operational cooperation and joint training in border and international security, focusing this model on the development of common capabilities, interoperability and the exchange of experiences to address transnational challenges. The workshop is proposed to focus on describing the aforementioned model in basic G-4 joint training, and its possible replication with international actors and agencies involved in border security. LEVERAGING TECHNOLOGY, COOPERATION, AND HUMANITARIAN APPROACHES TO BORDER **SECURITY IN AFRICA: THE ROLE OF GOVERNMENT AND NGOS**

TUESDAY 25TH MARCH - 9.30AM-12.30PM

Organized by the African Young People Support Centre (AYPSC), De La Colina Charity and African Smart Cities Innovation Foundation, this session at the 2025 World Border Security Congress in Madrid will focus on a multi-faceted approach to border security in Africa. Africa faces significant border challenges, from irregular migration and human trafficking to terrorism and regional instability. These challenges demand innovative solutions that go beyond traditional border control. This 3-hour session will explore how leveraging technology, enhancing cross-border cooperation, and integrating humanitarian interventions can create a more secure and humane border environment.

The session will examine the role of modern technology in enhancing border security while safeguarding human rights. Tools such as artificial intelligence (AI), biometrics, drones, and digital surveillance have already demonstrated significant potential. For instance, Al-enabled facial recognition systems have successfully curtailed human trafficking networks along the Nigeria-Niger border. In North Africa, drone technology has been used effectively to monitor vast, remote desert areas where insurgents and traffickers operate. These technologies, when coupled with cooperation between African governments and international bodies, can lead to more secure borders.

Cooperation between governments, regional organizations, and NGOs is equally crucial. The African Union Border Program (AUBP) has been a model of how states can work together to address transnational issues like terrorism and crossborder crime. NGOs play an indispensable role in this ecosystem, particularly by addressing the humanitarian crises often linked to harsh border

enforcement. The African Young People Support Centre has been at the forefront of mitigating irregular migration through educational programs, providing legal aid, and offering psychosocial support to vulnerable populations, particularly youth. NGO work along the Central African migratory routes has been critical in offering alternatives to risky, irregular migration.

The humanitarian aspect is crucial, especially in light of increasing global attention on the rights of refugees and internally displaced persons (IDPs). Organizations like Médecins Sans Frontières, in collaboration with regional NGOs, have provided critical healthcare and resources at key border points in Libya and Sudan. By incorporating humanitarian interventions, governments can ensure that border security does not come at the cost of human dignity.

In this Workshop, participants will gain insights into how technology, collaboration, and humanitarian approaches can be combined to create a more effective border security framework in Africa. The session will provide actionable strategies for stakeholders in government, international organizations, and NGOs, with the ultimate goal of creating secure and humane borders that protect both sovereignty and human rights.

SAFETRAVELLERS PARTICIPATION

The SafeTravellers Horizon Europe project is developing new methods of enabling frictionless, secure and efficient crossing of EU borders. It is exploring options for developing Digital Travel Credentials (DTCs) in a European context together with sensor and other supporting technologies to make this possible, including privacy-preserving mechanisms to meet ethics and GDPR requirements. SafeTravellers is both proposing a new way of citizen identification based on multi-modal biometrics to address current issues with identity documents, as well as an enhancement of the current method of identity verification at the borders through novel mechanisms to detect identity & travel document fraud and attacks on biometric systems.

The European Association of Airport & Seaport Police (EAASP), one of the partners involved in the EU-funded project SafeTravellers, is leading this workshop.

The project aims to deliver a near operational system at Technology Readiness Level 7 or above. SafeTravellers aims to:

- a) Strengthen the security at the borders and supporting associated law enforcement identity investigation activities.
- b) Improve the productivity of the Border Authorities by providing them with the appropriate tools

- to perform trustworthy identity management, combat identity fraud at the hardware, identity and travel document, and biometrics level.
- c) Offer a frictionless border crossing experience for EU and Third Country Nationals (TCN) citizens so they will not have to stop when crossing the border checkpoints.

At a Workshop at the World Border Security
Congress meeting in 2024, practitioners were given
the opportunity to contribute their operational
wishes for an enhanced border system as part of
the requirements definition phase. The aim of the
workshop in 2025 is to report progress on said
requirements and present the outline plans for Pilot
testing in Airport, Land Border, Rail and Maritime
environments. Participants will be invited to refine
the plans for the Pilots to make them as useful as
possible to the wider Border Security community.
The workshop will discuss opportunities for future
engagement of participants in project demonstration
activities in simulated operational environments.

The opportunity for participants is to identify issues of importance and thereby maximise their benefits from the final solution.
